Blessed are the Peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God.

Lt. Stephen McClanahan, commander of the Public Affairs section of the Little Rock Police Dept., was originally scheduled to speak to Pax Christi members on Thursday, July 13 at 7:00 regarding violence on Little Rock streets. Unfortunately, Lt. McClanahan had a last minute conflict and has assigned a member of his staff to take his place and provide information on what the police department is doing to address a recent surge in violent crime in our city. This officer works in the Office of Public Affairs and, in addition to providing details pertaining to crime statistics, types of criminal activity and factors contributing to increased violence, he will lead a discussion on ways the public

can better prepare themselves and defend against victimization.

The crime rate in Little Rock continues to increase at the same time as the Little Rock police force has seen a shortage of officers (currently 57 vacancies). Neighborhood Scout, a website that analyzes FBI data, revealed that Little Rock has a crime rate of 81 per 1000 residents. The chances of becoming a victim of violent or property crime is 1 in 12. This is 178% higher than the national average. After researching dangerous places

to live, Neighborhood Scout found LR to be one of the top 100 most dangerous cities in the US, with one of the highest violent crime rates in the nation. In 2017, there have been 29 homicides in Little Rock to date. There were 42 homicides in LR in 2016. According to Scout's analysis of FBI crime data, the chance of becoming a victim of rape, murder, manslaughter, armed robbery or assault in LR is 1 in 67 whereas it is 1 in 192 in the state of Arkansas. Crime in LR continues to escalate and we must not ignore this trend.

As part of our ongoing endeavor to put study and prayer into action, PCLR will highlight a project each month that demonstrates our goal of active peacemaking.

BACKPACKS FILLED WITH SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Last week, at the instigation of one our board members, Pax Christi Little Rock started a campaign to raise money to fill 328 backpacks with recommended school supplies for all of the children (grades K-5) at Rockefeller Elementary School (700 E. 17th Street, Little Rock, AR 72206). Pax Christi has until the beginning of the LRISD school year, August 14, 2017, to raise the money (app. \$3500-\$4000), buy materials, fill the backpacks and deliver them to students. Rockefeller was identified as the elementary school in the district most in need of our assistance. There are numerous children at the school who live in shelters and the majority live at or below the poverty level. We understand that these families cannot afford to buy school supplies and these children often have no materials to work with through the year. Having these supplies will allow them to start off the year on a positive note and free the teachers to teach instead of dealing with supplying basic learning materials.

Bishop Taylor and Kristen King: Training in Catholic Social Teachings

Bishop Anthony Taylor and Kristen King, a community organizer with VOICE from Oklahoma City, will be providing a training session on Catholic social teachings on Friday, July 21 from 9-11 am at Holy Souls Catholic Church. They have extended an invitation to all Pax Christi members and would appreciate their attendance at this event. In addition to sharing a general framework for how the church stands on pressing social issues, Bishop Taylor and Ms. King will relate these teachings to current events such as the recent executions that took place in Little Rock. Pax Christi was closely involved with other peace and social justice organizations in trying to halt those executions. Furthering our understanding of specific church doctrine would be helpful as we continue to speak out against all forms of violence.

Ms. King will also be sharing her 17 years of experience in community organizing. She will discuss ways to effectively organize our community to take action around social justice issues that are of most concern. Ms. King will also provide information about LROC (Little Rock Organizing Committee) and the ways this organization is already working to address social problems in the Little Rock area.
