# Lee Bass: Habitat for Humanity of Central Arkansas

Lee Bass, a member of the board of directors for Habitat for Humanity of Central Arkansas, will be presenting information on the history and mission of the local Habitat chapter on Thursday, May 9 at 7

2500 N. Tyler Street, LR). Lee has been volunteering with Habitat for the past seven years, with the majority of his time spent working on the construction team. Lee indicated that he has helped in the building of approximately 70 houses in Arkansas. In addition, he served for about a year as interim executive director of Habitat, completing his term this past March.

Lee Bass is a member of Our Lady of the Holy Souls Church in Little Rock where he has been a parishioner for the past 44 years. In addition to his work with Habitat for Humanity, Lee is very active in other social justice groups such as Settled Souls and Jericho Way. He works tirelessly helping set up stable homes for folks who have been living on the streets. Lee also attends Pax Christi Little Rock events on a regular basis and is always there to lend a helping hand. Prior to retirement, Lee worked for over 39 years as a project engineer, construction manger and chief of Supervision and Inspection for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. He has a degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Arkansas. Habitat for Humanity of Central Arkansas is a part of a global, nonprofit housing organization operated on Christian principles that seek to put God's love

into action by "building homes, communities and hope." This organization has built and rehabbed over 160 homes in Central Arkansas and over 30 homes overseas. # **New Schools Added** To Backpack Project

Pax Christi Little Rock is adding two new schools it's ongoing in mission to provide backpacks filled with school sup-

plies to elementary school children in both public and Catholic schools in Arkansas. Unfortunately, St. Edward's School will be closing next year and we will not be able to partner with them as we have this past year. However, PCLR decided to continue working with at least two Catholic schools, so North Little Rock Catholic Academy was invited to join in this effort (200 students). Pax Christi will continue to work with **St.** Theresa's Catholic School (232 students). In addition to our ongoing relationship with Rockefeller Elementary (328 students) in the Little Rock School District, Pax Christi Little Rock has added Osceola Elementary School in Osceola, Arkansas (1-4 grades, app 350 students). So, in the 2019-2020 school year we will fill 1,110 backpacks with school supplies compared to 654 backpacks this past school year. Our goal is to grow the mission each year so that our school children have basic tools they need to get a good start in life.

# PAX CHRISTI'S MISSION: TRANSFORMATION OF VIOLENCE INTO COMMUNITY

"Pax Christi is a Catholic peace and social justice movement that rejects war, preparation for war, every form of violence and domination as well as personal and systematic racism. This movement seeks to model the Peace of Christ in its witness to the mandate of the nonviolence of the Cross." Vision of Pax Christi USA

Pax Christi Little Rock was formed as a chapter of Pax Christi USA about 2 1/2 years ago. During these formative days of our organization, I have believed fervently in the mission statement written above, but I have



also been frequently overwhelmed by what I perceive to be the monumental task in front of our small group of passionate members. How could we possibly move this mountain of ever-present human conflict? What could we do to even begin to impact the presence of violence in our world? The news is always filled with wars, deaths, division and the ongoing threat of destruction across the globe. Overcoming these conflicts seemed impossible, and there was no shortage of people reminding me of that fact.

When we were in our early days, I had visions of anti-war demonstrations, long hours on the phone with our state representatives and endless conferences focusing on learning more about how we might "fight" the violence all around us. And certainly, we have been involved to some degree in all of these activities. But, as we have walked this path over the past couple of years, this vision of how to work towards peace

in our world has shifted significantly. I have watched us move from the realm of ideals and abstract dreams of a peaceful "heaven on earth" to practical engagement in specific projects and actions. Our physical investment in these interactions has served to make small differences in our community and, perhaps more importantly, helped us on our own path towards inner growth and connection. What then has followed is an increasing drive to grow our relationships with one another. These relationships, both within Pax Christ Little Rock and between Pax Christi LR and our Peace Partners, have led to a growing sense of community that is the very antithesis of war and conflict. We have experienced that when people work together towards common cause, there is little room for division. Of course, we sometimes experience disagreements on the fringes of our work, but when the focus remains on the work itself, the conflict has been minimal. I think this is also a factor of the focus being on others rather than on ourselves.

Over the course of these years, projects such as hurricane recovery in Puerto Rico, filling backpacks with school supplies, welcoming members of the LGBTQ community back to the Catholic Church, establishing a peace curriculum in our Little Rock schools, collecting corks to make shoes for underprivileged children, and the sharing community that has developed around our Speaker Series have taught us about the positive effect of group effort in overcoming all kinds of difficulty and division. There were so many times when we did not think it would be possible to complete the tasks placed in front of

us. Examples include building a gravel path up a small mountain to a newly built community center, "hoeing" up jungle vines on a Puerto Rican hillside in the rain to make a garden,

finding the funds to grow our "backpacks filled with school supplies" partner schools from one to four, collecting over 10,000 corks for shoes, and scheduling 30 different speakers to help educate us on issues in our community.

Throughout this period of time, we have taken very seriously the format that Pax Christi lays out for us in doing our work: prayer, study, action. We believe that action can best flow from a constant relationship with the Holy Spirit and that we will see more clearly the road in front of us if we prepare ourselves for the task through education and connection with others. The most interesting thing we have experienced is that, without exception, we have been led towards community. This is what grows us and this is what has sustained us as an organization.

One of the symbols that has held my attention and kept my focus on our path is the rose on a stem of barbed wire that Pax Christi USA adopted as its logo. I have thought a great deal about

that rose and what its deeper meanings reveal about our mission in Pax Christi. Of course, the barbed wire is a symbol of the divisions inherent in war and conflict. It reveals how we as humans tend to divide ourselves, one from the other, in our constant drive for power and domination in the world. Yet, Christ tells us and shows us that it is possible to transform this human state of division into a whole different way of being. The rose, I think, symbolizes the love and heart connection, both within ourselves and with others, that is necessary in order for this transformation to take place. If we love in the way Christ showed us to love, we will make it a point to know others, try to understand where they are coming from, and find a way to relate to them. Rather than trying to compete or separate ourselves from them, we

will strive to make their lives better within our relationship with them.

In Jungian psychology, the rose also signifies conunctio, the marriage of the opposites. This represents the regeneration of

things that have been separated but that are now resurrected on a new level. Transformed. In order for us to transform war into peace, violence into nonviolence, the rose instructs us that we cannot remain divided. Anytime we take a side and refuse to give in for the sake of power or ego, we cannot find peace. There is not one side that owns the path to peace. Rather, we must seek community, one with the other, in very practical terms if we are to overcome our insecure tendency to isolate ourselves in our pride and self-focus. The answers lie in the small interactive connections potentially available in each present moment.

My command to you is: love your enemies, pray for your persecutors. Matthew 5:44
