and Justice, Arkansas WAND, Arkansas Peace Week and World Beyond War to promote an anti-war message to be displayed on a bill-board facing west on 3rd Street and Markham near the Capitol building. A committee with representatives from each of these groups has been meeting for over two months to fine tune the message meant to convey the im-

two months to fine tune the message meant to convey the importance of funding healthcare over warfare. The United States' newest bomber program, the B-21, will cost \$97 billion, with a long history of cost overruns. Meanwhile, just a fraction of the B-21 budget could help fulfill the urgent need for testing during the COVID-19 crisis. \$550 million, the cost of one B-21 bomber, can

pay for over 10 million Covid-19 tests. After several meetings, the committee approved this message posted above. Including the logo of each organization involved is designed to send the message that there is a coalition of peacemaking groups that is supporting nonviolence and re-direction of resources to healthcare during this time of crisis. Information further defining each of these individual groups will be included on the Peace-Wins.org webpage.

Pax Christi Little Rock is supporting this effort financially and has committed to helping fund the billboard for up to two months. Depending upon the success of the campaign and the feedback received from the public, the PCLR board will discuss the potential for ongoing financial support.

Holy Sews supplies hospitals and funeral homes with a stock of layettes that families can choose from. All of this is provided at no charge to the families that they serve.

During this time of COVID-19, Holy Sews has also added on a new mission. They are working to make "no-sew" masks to give to hospitals, nursing homes and residential care facilities. Pax Christi LR is working with this organization to keep up with the evergrowing demand for protective masks. I heard that we are all in the same boat, but it's not like that. We are in the same storm, but not in the same boat. Your ship could be shipwrecked and mine might not be or vice versa.

For some, quarantine is optimal. A moment of reflection, of re-connection, easy in flip flops, with a cocktail or coffee. For others, this is a desperate financial and family crisis.

For some that live alone, they're facing endless loneliness. While for others it is peace, rest and time with their mother, father, sons and daughters.

With the \$600 weekly increase in unemployment, some are bringing more money into their households that when they were working. Others are working more hours for less money due to pay cuts or loss in sales.

Some families of 4 just received \$3400 from the stimulus while other families of 4 saw \$0.

Some were concerned about getting a certain candy for Easter while others were concerned if there would be enough bread milk, and eggs for the weekend.

Some want to go back to work because they don't qualify for unemployment and are running out of money. Others want to kill those who break quarantine.

Some are home spending 2-3 hours a day helping their child with online schooling

while others are spending 2-3 hours a day to educate their children on top of a 10-12 hour workday.

Some have experienced the near-death of the virus, some have already lost someone from it and some are not sure if their loved ones are going to make it. Others don't believe this is a big deal

Some have faith in God and expect miracles during this 2020. Others say the worst is yet to come.

So friends, we are not in the same boat. We are going through a time when our perceptions and needs are completely different.

Each of us will emerge, in our own way, from this storm. It is very important to see beyond what is seen at first glance. Not just looking, actually seeing.

We are all on different ships during this storm experiencing a very different journey.

Realize that and be kind, please.



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Backpacks Are Out, But School Supplies Are In!

In these uncertain times, it has been very difficult to plan for long-term projects. This has been par-



ticularly true for our "backpacks filled with school supplies" mission that we have sponsored for the past three years. Given the uncertainty of schools reopening, the need to order supplies well ahead of time, and fundraising shortages, it has been helpful to speak with school officials like Kristy Dunn, principal at St. Theresa's Catholic School and Denise Troutman, principal at North Little Rock Catholic Academy to better assess their needs for the upcoming year.

Both principals have been extremely helpful in providing a core list of supplies that students in each grade would benefit from whether students were remote or back in the classroom. Ms. Dunn and Ms. Troutman indicated that backpacks would not be necessary and that the supplies provided for each student were the main concern. Officials at Rockefeller Elementary will also be consulted to calculate their exact supply needs as they make a determination on whether or not to re-open Little Rock Independent School District.

Pax Christi LR currently has a budget of approximately \$5000 for the school supply mission. Given fundraising constraints, this is significantly lower than last year. However, without the necessity of buying the backpacks, it looks like it will be possible to provide school supplies for all grades at all three of Pax Christi Little Rock partner schools.

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THE GIFT OF PAX CHRISTI

There is an old Hasidic story that I came across just the other day during a time when I was worrying about what was going to happen to our young Pax Christi Little Rock chapter and whether it could survive these challenging days of COVID-19. Over the past six weeks, I have seen so many of our projects put on hold and our opportunity to gather in communion vanish as we isolate to protect one another. Certainly, we have found other ways to be of service, but at first they seemed so small compared to some of the projects we had grown over the past three and a half years.

And then I found this story and, in retrospect, realized what has actually been happening in the midst of Pax Christi since the virus arrived.

An old Rabbi once asked one of his pupils how they could tell when night ended and day had begun.

"Could it be," asked one of the students, "When you can see an animal in the distance and tell whether it is a sheep or a dog?"

"No," answered the Rabbi.

Another asked, "Is it when you can look at a tree in the distance and tell whether it's a fig tree or a peach tree?'

"No," answered the Rabbi.

"Then when is it?" the pupils demanded.

"It is when you can look on the face of any man or woman and see that it is your sister or brother. Because if you cannot see this, it is still night."

In reflection, I think that perhaps this transition caused by the pandemic has given us an opportunity to learn more about moving from night into day.



In search of peace

I know many of us have switched from rushing around trying to get it all done in our daily lives to taking moments to draw closer to others or just take some quiet time. This has been a vital reminder of how Christ modeled giving peace to others, often one person at a time. I've been hearing so many stories of people taking the time to talk with an aging parent or actually spending time doing things with their spouse and children. It seems that when we slow down enough, we might just fall into that present moment where Christ, and the peace He brings, resides.

Back in March, which seems a very long time ago now, I remember being pretty stressed and wondering how all of us in Pax Christi were going to get everything done. At that time, I wasn't looking into very many people's faces in any real way. I didn't think I had time! Suddenly, when everything fell off the calendar, there was time to be more intentional about day-today interactions. At first, it seemed there was nothing to do. I felt really guilty about that! Then, Pax Christi members began to find avenues to help in small ways, one person at a time. We gathered and delivered food for some people who had no shelter in conjunction with Street Ministries and then we adopted our family of nine that we visit with (at a distance) every couple of weeks. And even with the masks we are making for medical personnel, we only make one mask at a time and there is no rush. This has turned into a meditative, in the moment task, leading to reflection on who might wear this mask to help and praying for their health as they fight on the front lines of this pandemic.

So, another understanding that has come from this strange time is that God always has something to teach

us, and his ways are definitely not our ways. I'm beginning to understand that bigger is definitely not better and that the gift of Pax Christi occurs when there is a personal, intimate connection between two or more people. In addition to just being in the same room at the same time, I think both people must be drawn to the present moment together, either by great love or great pain. They must actually see one another, look into one another's eyes. It is when this happens that we know we are in the right place at the right time, ready to give it all away, standing in the light with our brothers and sisters.

Sometime in your life, hope that you might see one starved man and the look on his face when the bread finally arrives. Hope that you might have baked it or bought or even kneaded it yourself. For that look on his face, for your meeting his eyes across a piece of bread, you might be willing to lose a lot, suffer a lot, or die a little, even. Daniel Berrigan
