Bishop Anthony Taylor to Speak on Just Peace vs. Just War Theory

Bishop Anthony Taylor will be the featured guest at the Pax Christi Speaker series on Thursday, October 15 at 6:30 pm via Zoom. Bishop Taylor will provide background and discuss the impact of the Just War Theory, a teaching of the Church that originated during the time of St. Augustine. Historically, this theory has been used to help discern how and when military force might be applied in the defense of a nation in time of conflict.

It is significant that there are now many in the Church who have found the Just War Theory to be inadequate, particularly in this era of nuclear weapons. Bishop Taylor will make the case for a doctrine of Just Peace based on scripture, social teachings of the Catholic Church, and the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

Bishop Taylor will also expand on the Pax Christi Catholic Nonviolence Initiative that was launched at the Nonviolence and Just Peace Conference held in Rome April 11-13, 2016 and cosponsored by the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace. This initiative, a project of Pax Christi International, affirms the vision and practice of active nonviolence at the heart of the Catholic Church and is committed to the long-term vocation of healing and reconciling both people and the planet.

Bishop Anthony Taylor has recently written articles on the importance of re-examining the just war theory. He has reviewed the social teachings of the Catholic Church to make a case for Just Peace, which in the words of the Catechism is "the work of justice and the effect of charity." Bishop Taylor is a member of Pax Christi USA and refers to the nonviolent practices found in the Pax Christi Catholic Nonviolence Initiative as alternatives to warfare.

Goodwill Industries works to enhance people's dignity and quality of life by strengthening their communities, eliminating barriers to opportunity, and helping them reach their full potential through learning and the power of work. Goodwill was founded in Boston by Rev.

Edgar Helms, a Methodist minister and early social innovator. Rev. Helms created the Goodwill philosophy of "not charity, but a chance" when he collected used household goods and clothing in wealthier areas of the city and then hired people without resources to mend and repair the goods. They were then sold or given to people who repaired them. More than 118 years later, Goodwill remains a household name and leading nonprofit provider of educational and work services.

PEACE CURRICULUM IN THE SCHOOLS

Three years ago, Pax Christi Little Rock worked with school counselor Mildred Calhoun to develop a peace curriculum for Rockefeller Elementary School that was first implemented during Peace Week 2017. Since then, this peace curriculum has been expanded in scope and has been incorporated by the Little Rock School District, Pulaski County School District, and Arkansas Catholic Schools. With the assistance of Bob Estes and Arkansas Coalition for Peace and Justice, the majority of the elementary schools in the state now have access to this curriculum of nonviolence.

In 2020, we invited all Arkansas schools and youth groups to participate in presenting these lessons teaching peacemaking skills to the youth in our state.

Pax Christi LR Completes Landscaping Project with Habitat for Humanity



Over a year ago, Pax Christi initiated a campaign to raise \$2500 in order to pull

several peace groups together to work with Habitat for Humanity to landscape one of their newly built homes. The fundraising went well and the

money was raised over a period of a few months. However, the actual landscaping par-



ty was postponed due to the onset of COVID-19 restrictions in March, 2020.

Finally, on the morning of September



25, Pax Christi Little Rock, Arkansas Coalition for Peace and Justice, Arkansas WAND, Community of Christ and Braver Angels sent volunteer members to

work with Central Arkansas Habitat for Humanity on landscaping what was initially planned to include 4 homes in North Little Rock off of Allen Street in a cul-de-sac called Potter Cove. It seemed no accident that this opportunity presented itself right in the middle of Peace Week 2020.



The crew of 11 arrived around 8 am on a perfect 70 degree, partly cloudy day. They were assigned to

complete landscaping on 4 homes. However, by 9:30 almost all of the work was completed on those houses. So, the

Habitat supervisor asked if the crew could continue land-scaping the entire cul-de-sac. The volunteers were more than willing, so Susi Blanco, Pax Christi member, was sent



off with a credit card to get more bushes, mulch, etc. By 11:30, all seven houses were landscaped with an additional 14 potted flowers to leave on porches to welcome the new tenants.



To add to the fun, Lee Bass supplied donuts, Caroline Stevenson showed up with lemonade and

cookies and Pax Christi provided pizza once the job was completed. Thanks go out to Hamid Ebrahimifar, Matthew Bryant, Mary Hunt, Tamara Tahat, Jan Pipkin, Jacques Pierini, Susi and Jose Blanco, Lee Bass, Sherry Simon, and Caroline Stevenson for their hard work.

PAX CHRISTI HOSTS TABLE AT VIRTUAL LEGACY OF LIFE BANQUET













Pax Christi Little Rock has supported the Legacy of Life Banquet, a fundraiser for the Arkansas Pregnancy Resource Center (APRC), for the past two years. In 2020, the program for the banquet will be aired online due to COVID restrictions. So, although PCLR cannot host a table in person, the group will give a donation to the Pregnancy Resource Center and discuss the possibility of a small gathering to watch the production online. It is scheduled to run via YouTube-Arkansas Pregnancy Resource Center beginning on Thursday, November 5 at 6:30 pm.

The Arkansas Pregnancy Resource Center is a non-profit organization that has been working in Little Rock since 1977 to provide women with an alternative to abortion. APRC offers free and confidential services to pregnant women such as medical grade pregnancy tests, limited obstetrical ultrasounds, testing for STDs, parenting classes, options consultation, postabortion healing and abortion pill reversal. They are located at 2 Office Park Drive and serve all regardless of age, race, gender, financial status, religious affiliation or sexual orientation.
