Tutti, at the next Speaker Series meeting scheduled for Thursday, April 15 at 6:30 pm. Dr. Walter is a neonatologist currently working at Arkansas Children's Hospital and UAMS. He received his medical degree from the University of Kansas School of Medicine and has over 45 years of experience in the medical field.

Dr. Walter is also a member of St. Margaret's Episcopal Church. He has done an extensive study of Fratelli Tutti and has shared his thoughtful work with many in the Christian community. Fratelli Tutti is an encyclical written by Pope Francis and released to Catholic Churches worldwide on the feast day of St. Francis, October 4, 2020. Fratelli Tutti means "all brothers and sisters" and addresses the global problems on which the coronavirus pandemic has shed light. It is given as a radical challenge, offering a blueprint of a world that is possible after the coronavirus if we adopt a "culture of care." The Gospel story at the heart of Fratelli Tutti is that of the Good Samaritan, challenging us to reach out to those in need, caring for our neighbor.

have a place to call home. Michelle has encountered some life-changing health issues and is very focused on trying to stay well. Having a home will really help



her in this struggle. Michelle enjoys nature and being outside.

The second person moved was Lee Andrew, a 68-year-old Army Veteran who is now retired. He has 3 sons, a daughter and 9 grandchildren. He used to run and compet-



ed in marathons, but he now has some serious back problems that make it difficult for him to get around. He is able to receive support services from the VA. Lee Andrew loves to play pool and read National Geo-



Pax Christi LR Continues Study on Nonviolence with PCUSA

Pax Christi Little Rock has joined other Pax Christi USA members in studying <u>Advancing Nonviolence and Just Peace in the Church and the World.</u> This book is a culmination of the three year global conversation among church leaders, community organizers, activists, social scientists and theologians on how the Catholic Church might return to its Gospel nonviolence roots and work together to transform the violence so prevalent in our lives.

The study involves zoom presentations by contributing authors alternating with local group meetings. Pax Christi LR members have been hearing the authors' experiences working with the Vatican and other groups in developing a better foundation for nonviolence in our world.



A true friend to Pax Christi Little Rock, Raymond Bertasi works hard making beautiful blue-

bird houses in his woodworking shop. He spends several hours each week putting these homes together, making the poles and even topping each house off with a painted bluebird. His goal is to raise \$5000 to be used to buy backpacks filled with school sup-

plies for elementary students in 4 Arkansas schools. So far, Raymond has raised \$3,690 before expenses and has built and shared 40 birdhouses. If you

PCLR Initiates "Blessing Bag" Program for Homeless on Streets

giene items for the homeless in Little Rock (blessing bags). A committee was established including Jan Pipkin (chairperson), Sandee Haslauer, Martina Pierini, Jacques Pierini, and Sherry Simon. The first organizational meeting

was held on Friday, April 2. The committee decided that the first step was to fill 5 bags for each board member to give out to the homeless on Little Rock streets. The bags will be filled with

items including a roll of nickels for bus transfers, resource pocket guides for needed services, granola bars, mask, hygienic wipes, reading glasses, socks, water bottles, panchos, plastic bags, gum/tictacs, and halo tangerines.

Once board members have the experience of sharing these bags with folks they encounter on the street, Pax Christi will send representatives out to parish youth groups to speak with them about using this ministry as a service project and working together to make "blessing bags' for their parishes to hand out.

AN EASTER MESSAGE

BISHOP JOHN STOWE, OFM CONV.

"Why do you look for the living among the dead?" Luke 24:5

That was the question from the angels poised outside the empty tomb to the faithful women who had arrived to perform the sad but

reverent ritual of giving a proper anointing to the already buried body of Jesus. How could they grasp the startling meaning of those words? It defies all of human experience and they had witnessed with their own eyes the tragic end of Jesus' earthly life even as many of his followers joined in the taunts of the deriders or ran away in disappointment and despair.

With the evidence of an empty tomb before their eyes, and knowing how soundly the tomb was sealed and how securely it was protected, what other kind of answer could there be? Is it true?

It is a challenging question, especially for

Christians, throughout the ages. It is one that as Pax Christians we should ask ouras well selves during this Eastertide. **Do** we acknowledge how "our way of life" may actual-

ly be related to the culture of death? We live in a nation that again and again chooses to build up state-of-the-art weaponry and seeks to employ the best of technology for the purpose of destroying human life — often claiming that our defense is for the

purpose of protecting "our way of life". We know the industries that engage in weapons research (including nuclear weapons) employ many people, i.e. "provide a living" for them. Is that not like searching for the living among the dead?

What about the preservation of a culture that depended on the enslavement of people from Africa? Monuments and plagues that the descendants of the enslaved must see day after day and the rebel flag flapping in the breeze defended as a symbol of "our way of life"? And what about those unaccompanied minors, teenagers, little kids, toddlers held in confinement at our southern border because their presence might threaten "our way of life", as if they were taking bread from our tables rather than eager to work to provide for those tables? They ran away from death-dealing gangs and the devastating consequences of climate change which eliminated their ability to provide for themselves — and no one offered a hand.

There are many more examples that resemble the apparent failure of Good Friday as Jesus' body was sealed in a tomb. <u>But that cannot be</u> and is not the end of the story.

With the celebration of Easter, hope is reborn. Life is possible, we learn, even in the midst of what appears to be death. If our eyes are open, we can't help but see the Good Fridays that are all around us, the plight of a crucified people. Our faith assures us that they will know life in abundance. What a great celebration and great tribute to the Risen Christ it would be to separate ourselves from the powers of death and stop looking for the dead. Living One among the "He has gone ahead of you" (Matthew 28:7) are great words of promise from the angel to the women at the tomb ... and to us. Jesus has shown us the way to the fullness of life. Let us commit ourselves to that life in abundance that God desires for all the human family.

Christ Is Risen! Indeed He is Risen!
