Pax Christi LR Members Participate in the 40-Day Fast for Christian Nonviolence

Rosemarie Pace, Cocoordinator of Pax Christi New York State, invited Pax Little Rock members to join her group and others in a 40-day fast for nonviolence, ending on August 9, the anniversary of



the nuclear bombing of Nagasaki, Japan. Pax Christi Little Rock members fasted every Tuesday in solidarity with many others across the country.

Although it is not well known, Nagasaki was the largest Christian community in Japan at the time of the bombing. As Christians, we must never forget the horror unleashed upon innocent civilians who were powerless in the face of war. As this fast draws to a close, we remember the bombing and pray for the abolition of nuclear weapons and all weapons of war-be they bombs or bullets, hatred, fear, vengeance, or greed.

Each Tuesday during the fast, each participant shared a prayer for peace. Here is the closing prayer, written by **Fr.**John Dear, called A Gathering Storm of Hope:

God of peace, as we remember our sisters and brothers killed in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, we repent of the atomic bomb, of those horrific acts and of all the death and destruction that we have wrought.

As our country continues to design, build, and maintain these genocidal weapons of mass destruction, we repent of our mortal sin.

As our country threatens the whole human race and the entire planet, we repent of our willingness to destroy the gift of your Creation.

As we continue to hold the world hostage and commit the ultimate act of terrorism by threatening to use these nuclear weapons, we repent of nuclear terrorism and the fear, distrust, and infidelity we spread.

For our silence, indifference, fear and despair, we repent. For all the violence we have personally committed, and for our own complicity with the culture of war and nuclear weapons, we repent.

Disarm our hearts, disarm our cities, disarm our military and our nation, disarm our world. Give us the gift of a world without war, poverty, or nuclear weapons, a new world of peace.

And so we pledge-

In this world of hatred, indifference, fear and anxiety to be instruments of your love;

In this world of selfishness, greed, and materialism, to be instruments of your selfless service and generosity;

In this world of revenge, retaliation, and resentment, to be instruments of your mercy, compassion, and forgiveness;

In this world of doubt and despair, to be instruments of faith and hope;

In this world of lies and darkness, to be instruments of truth and light;

In this world of war, nuclear weapons, and death, to be instruments of your peace, nonviolence and life.

packing and delivering school supplies to St. Theresa's Catholic School, North

Little Rock Catholic Academy, Broadmoor Elementary in Pine Bluff and Booker T. Washington Elementary in



Little Rock. As part of the backpack



project, PCLR raised an additional \$1150 (to add to the \$1450 already budgeted) to provide \$100 gift cards for 24 teachers at Carol Smith Elementary in Osceola.

This school has been our peace partner for several years, but this year they set up a new schedule, starting



school in mid-July before PCLR could



obtain the school supplies. Since teachers are always helping out their students with



school supplies, Pax Christi decided to support the teachers! The backpack program has been coor-

dinated by the Pax Christi Little Rock treasurer, Sherry Martin, since its inception in 2017. Sherry stores supplies at her home all year long as she looks for "bargains" so



that PCLR can stay within budget and provide for as many schools as possible.



Once again this year, Pax Christi did not hold a "packing party" due to heightened Covid concerns. However, we hope to

return to sharing this project with many

other volunteers next year.



at the State House Convention Center. This is the first time the event has been held in person since 2020





If We Stop to Listen, We Find Answers to Our Biggest Questions All Around Us



Have you ever gone through periods in your life when you felt overwhelmed and unable to cope with life on a day to day basis? I was going through a time like that about a month ago following a prolonged illness that

seemed to take away all the good energy that I had felt over these past years. I was worried that it would never come back. I kept trying to move forward, but really all I wanted to do was sleep.

Luckily for me, Pax Christi Little Rock had planned a retreat at Subiaco with Cackie Upchurch back in January, 2022 that had to be postponed due to Covid until this July. At first, I was not thinking I could go because of all the different things I had on my plate to catch up for lost time. However, once I got there, things began to change. Cackie reminded us all about the importance of being present in each moment, something I had not been focusing on recently. My mind began to slow down and I began pulling away from all of the "shoulds" waiting for me back in Little Rock.

Then, on our second day of retreat, Cackie gave us some homework. She asked us to consider what images drew us closer to God. I had the opportunity to find a space outside on the pastoral grounds of Subiaco to consider this question more deeply. I found a shaded arbor where I sat for a time quietly taking in the intricate vines of wisteria that wove their way across the top of this secluded spot. Their woven tapestry provided rare respite from the 100 degree heat outside. A cool breeze blew through a protected through the sanctuary and I saw birds leaves building nests in the branches. Was this an image of God? All I could think of was the understanding I had received years

ago in Honduras-we are all connected. So then it came to me that perhaps I didn't need to put so much pressure on myself to be perfect and get it all done myself. Without concern for criticism and rebuke and simply growing where



they are led by their Creator, these vines formed a beautiful shelter, s space to be shielded from the hot sun and reflect on life's deeper questions. They had a purpose. And although each began as a singular tree, once they joined there was no distinguishing one from the others. We are all intertwined so intricately with one another and with God whether we are aware of it or not. Standing alone, there is nothing new created. But letting go (being vulnerable and open) and not thinking just about myself, leaves room for so many possibilities with others. No pride of place, no seeking of power-all connected into one living organism, supporting one another and supporting life.

How does the vine know in which direction to grow? There is no planning, no motivations or goals set before the joining. It simply seeks. . . life. Suddenly, all of my own perceived list of things that "I must get done" seemed much less important. Because I wasn't alone. And because maybe I could trust the vine to lead me in a positive direction in



each moment without fretting constantly over my own agenda. The agenda that separates me from others and from Life.

I am the vine and you are the branches. He who lives in me and I in him, will produce abundantly, for apart from me you can do nothing. A man who does not live in me is like a withered, rejected branch, picked up to be thrown into the fire and burnt. If you live in me, and my words stay part of you, you may ask what you will-it will be done for you. John 15:5-7
